# Commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War

Local Emmaville resident Roy Colin Wells is an unassuming man- at 97 years old he still stands tall and is as sharp as a tack in both conversation and memory.



He, and his wife Edna, have loved ones gravitate to them as often as possible, a testimony to the bond that is shared between this family, who describe themselves as having a life that is "rich with love". One of few remaining WWII veterans, Roy has many interesting stories to tell, so humble in nature though, he will say that he "didn't do much"- which is perhaps even more reason to explore this special man's story.

After growing up at Emmaville, and attending ECS for his education, Roy enlisted into the armed forces on the 11<sup>th</sup> November 1941, at just 18 years of age (harrowing when the comparison is made with students of today, still at school when they reach their milestone birthday).



Roy's sense of duty saw his journey begin at Rutherford, near Newcastle for training which "was a boot camp, alright". In February 1942, Roy was assigned to a sapper unit with the Royal Australian Engineers and he commenced working up and down the NSW coastline building roads and bridges before being sent to Kapooka for specialist explosives training (expanding the knowledge that Roy already had from his mining experience).

The next stage in Roy's journey came when he was assigned to the 7<sup>th</sup> Field Engineers at Coffs Harbour before being sent to a staging camp at Brisbane awaiting overseas deployment.



In early 1945, Roy's battalion arrived at Bouganville (an eastern lying island that is part of Papua New Guinea). It was here that Roy's specialist training came into play, working on bridges and roads as a specialist machine operator, frequently being tasked to help other units with their assignments. The Japanese often ambushed these operations; there was no safe place in the jungle, Roy saw mates killed in action and felt that luck was on his side many times.

Even after the Japanese surrender to end WWII in the Pacific, Roy remained in Bouganville to continue with work that had to be completed. Afterwards, he was sent to Rabaul to help clean up and rebuild, foremost the airstrip which had been bombed during the war. Then, eight months after the war ended, Roy was finally able to make it home to Emmaville.

Moving forward, 75 years has passed since WWII ended, and Roy has had a fulfilling life with Edna and their six children, many great-grandchildren. grandchildren and Recently, in a small service, during current Covid 19 restrictions, Roy was acknowledged as part of the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War. He received a commemorative medallion and certificate (bearing the signatures of our Governor-General David Hurley and Prime Minister Scott Morrison) in recognition of his service. To the on-looker it was obvious that Roy was taken and deeply grateful for this special aback commemoration, one that I feel most privileged to have been a part of.

#### Important information for HSC students

The following information is from the Department of Education.

Given that the HSC exams are fast approaching and to minimize disruption during this period, additional precautionary measures should be taken by Year 12 students and their families while outside of school and in the wider community.

This includes:

- Stay 1.5m apart where possible
- Wear a mask if physical distancing isn't possible
- Get tested ASAP if they have even the mildest of symptoms
- Tell the clinician doing the test they are a Year 12 student and to mark the referral 'Urgent -HSC student'
- Stay home and self-isolate until results are known
- Receive a negative test result
- Before returning to school; showing the school a screenshot of an SMS result is sufficient Call the contact number provided by the clinic if results are not received within 36 hours
